

Ellen Lyons has worked for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Alaska District, as a Regulatory Project Manager since 2003. As a Regulatory Project Manager, she has been involved in controversial development projects in Alaska including oil and gas developments on the North Slope, the construction of the longest bridge in Alaska, bank stabilization projects, large resource development projects, and large transportation projects. Ms. Lyons is a Public Involvement Specialist for the Alaska District and part of the Public Involvement Specialist Program with the IWR Conflict Resolution and Public Participation Center of Expertise. She conducts and facilitates inter-agency meetings with applicants and

agencies to resolve environmental conflicts as a Regulatory Project Manager as a regular part of her job. Ms. Lyons began her federal employment in 1989. She has worked as a Backcountry Ranger for the Park Service and a Wildland Firefighter for the Park Service and Forest Service. Previous to working for the USACE she served as a District Hydrologist for the Panhandle National Forest in Idaho, where she worked on Environmental Impact Statements for timber harvest projects, road obliteration and watershed restoration projects.
