


The SCA Mission: To build the next generation of conservation leaders and inspire lifelong stewardship of our environment and communities by engaging young people in hands-on service to the land.


SCA - National Reach and Scope

SCA volunteers make an impact in all 50 states from national parks to big cities.


Our more than 75,000 alumni go on to influence all sectors of society: government (28%), corporations (23%), education (25%), and nonprofit/other (24%).

SCA & Water Resources



- → In 2014, SCA's water conservation programs accomplished:
 - 5.4 million gallons of water saved
 - 285 miles of threatened shoreline restored
 - 1,300 research projects completed
 - 7,730 acres of watersheds surveyed
 - 38,700 aquatic animals assessed and protected
 - 32,830 people educated
