SUBJECT: Handshake Partnership Program - Fiscal Year 2017 Recipients

- 1. I am pleased to announce the recipients for the fiscal year 2017 (FY 2017) Handshake Partnership Program funding. These outstanding partnerships demonstrate the efforts and successes of our field projects in working with stakeholders to foster their involvement in improving and protecting our parks and natural resources. This initiative supports U.S. Army Corps of Engineers efforts in being a community partner and working on grassroots partnering projects.
- 2. The enclosed list of the FY 2017 Handshake recipients are diverse in both geographic area and in project ideas. Nine projects have been funded that span seven Corps districts within four divisions.
- 3. The funded projects involve 45 partners who have pledged more than \$308,000, (54%) of the \$570,000 to be invested in these projects. There are two first time recipients and five projects where the partner is funding more than half of the total project cost. Collectively, these projects will improve recreational opportunities and facilities for all visitors, providing access for land and water-based recreation, connecting communities to outdoor opportunities, protecting and conserving natural resources, enhancing our environmental stewardship mission, increasing public awareness of the value of water resources, and engaging federal, state, and local partners in a shared vision. We are very proud of our Corps team members and our valued partners!
