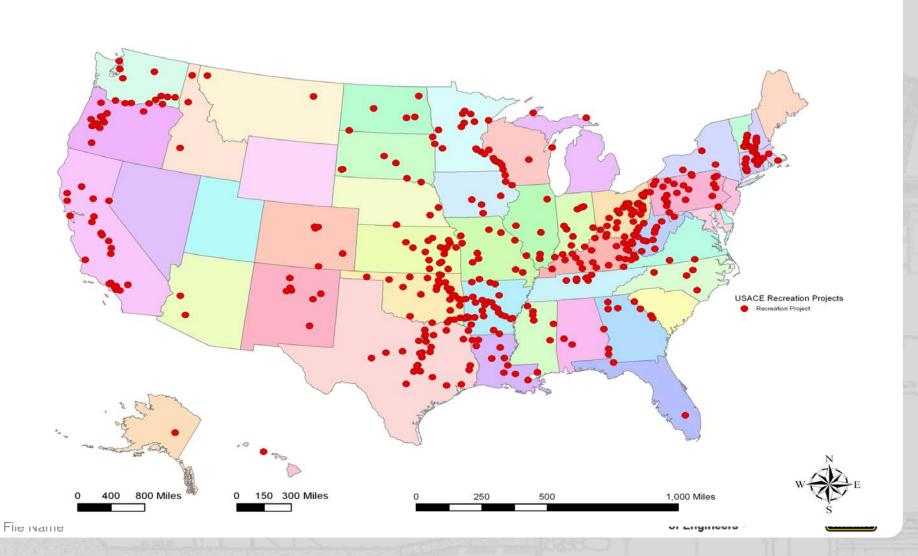

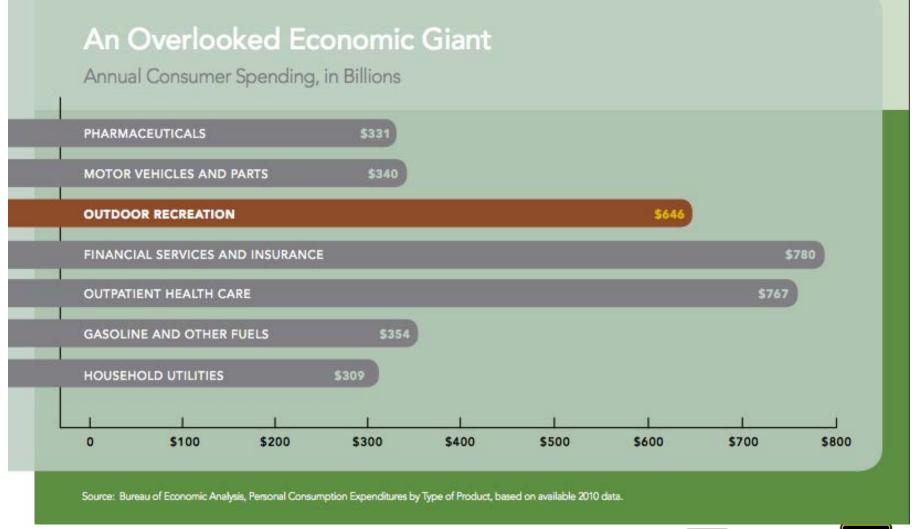

RECREATION VISITOR USE MANAGEMENT & PUBLIC SAFETY

Visitor Use Management and Public Safety are the foundations of the Recreation program. The purpose is to avoid unsafe, destructive public use of federal lands & waters. Necessary for project mission success.

Recreation facilities, programs, and personnel ensure public safety and protection of land and water resources. Public recreation is the product of these programs.

The Recreation Business Line funds programs and policies necessary to manage where people go, what they can do safely for themselves and others, what they can't do, and actions necessary to protect and maintain natural and man-made features.

Recreation Budget funds:

- Daily operations and maintenance of public use facilities—service contracts and in-house labor
- Recreation infrastructure investments
- Rangers staffing and uniforms
- · Vehicles, trucks, cars, boats
- Utilities
- Partnerships/Volunteers/fee collection
- Water Safety programs, people & products
- Project patrols and regulation enforcement
- Real Estate management & inspection of recreation outgrants







LAND USES, ENVIRONMENTAL AND CULTURAL STEWARDSHIP

Sustainably managing the natural resources on project lands is essential to meet project missions.

Land use and protection issues are complex and can be controversial.



The Environmental Stewardship Business Line funds:

- Programs and activities that manage project lands and waters to protect federal land interests,
- Manage public uses
- Sustainably manage soil, water, terrestrial and aquatic flora and fauna
- Protect cultural and archeological resources

Key ES funding priorities:

- Master plans and shoreline management plans
- Boundary maintenance & encroachments
- Cultural Resources
- Invasive Species
- Wildlife habitat management
- Pollinator Initiative









PUBLIC & RANGER SAFETY

Safety is the highest priority for the public and our employees.

Visitor Assistance

- Firearms: legislative proposals, lawsuits
- Youth Corps engagement
- Uniform program
- Water Safety
- Ranger Program

Water Safety Program—Actions to reduce fatalities

- Highest Frequency: Swimming in undesignated areas and off boats, Males 18-35, Boating/Personal Watercraft
- Campaign "Life Jackets Worn...Nobody Mourns" developed through grant by USCG to the Corps Foundation
- Expand responsibilities to support the program: RE, RM, OC,
- Provide additional focus on projects with high risk

FEDERAL LANDS TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM- USACE IMPLEMENTATION

Road/parking improvements at highly visited recreation areas to address backlog maintenance where condition negatively impacts public access and use of areas

 Road/parking projects not generally competitive in USACE budget process.

Bridge program work for compliance with NBIS and FHWA Guidelines. FLTP allows improvements to bridges at CW projects that support public safety, recreation access and regional economies.

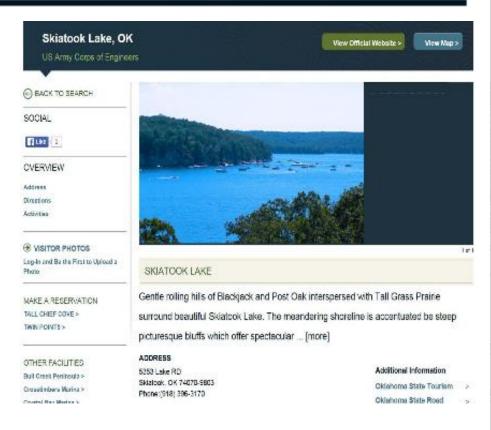

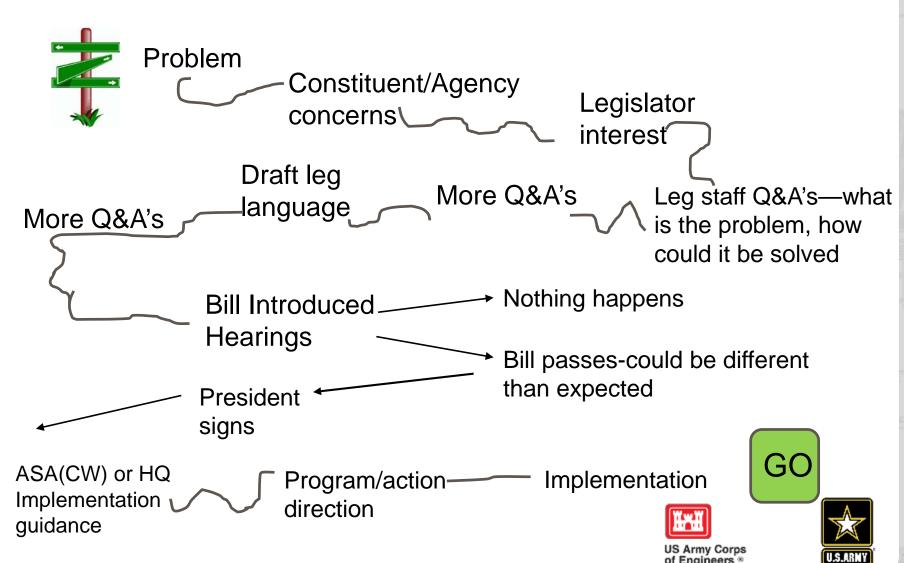

EVERY KID IN A PARK

The Goal is to build a new generation of stewards that will work to protect America's natural and cultural resources for the future by:

- Providing 4th graders an in-person experience with their public lands and waters
- Inspiring parents, teachers, and other partners to engage with the outdoors

Why 4th Graders? Research has shown that 10/11 years old is a critical time to connect with children on values and attitudes about

the environment.





AMERICA THE BEAUTIFUL PASS PROGRAM

Implementation January 1, 2016
5 pass types plus Corps Annual Pass
Program managed by an interagency committee
Two types of sales/distribution: on site, on the web
Revenues

- Law requires that the revenue be retained by the agency
- OMB requires that the revenue be reported in the President's budget, like the Recreation User Fees as "Additional New Resources"—not appropriations
- OMB required estimation of revenues from ATB and Special Uses for FY 17 budget-\$1.2 million
- OMB reduced the FY 17 Recreation budget by \$1.2 million

Return of revenues to projects is yet unresolved





SPECIAL USE PERMITS

100% of fees collected will be retained at the Project at which the fees are collected and available for use without further appropriation.

Revenue will be used solely for administering the Special Use Permits and carrying out related operation and maintenance activities at the site at which the fees are collected.

Special Event Permits: Special Event Permit may be issued for the organized use of project resources for a specific purpose and limited duration, beyond what is normally engaged in by individuals or groups on a day-to-day basis

- \$75.00 may be charged for each permit.
- Additional fees may be assessed to recover costs incurred by the USACE
- Events for-profit will be assessed a fee of 2% of gross revenue.

Special Activity Permits: Special Activity Permits may be issued for the specific use of project resources benefiting an individual or small group that may be recurring in nature.

Special Activity Fee may be charged to cover:

- Administrative cost of the program.
- Recover cost incurred by the Corps to manage the permit program.

Special Facility Permits: A fee may be charged for the use of specialized recreation facilities (e.g. group picnic shelters, multipurpose courts, amphitheaters, etc.)

Items classified and collected as Recreation Use Fees (campsites, beating) boat ramps are NOT considered "Special Facilities"
