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



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Interpretation Defined

Interpretation is a mission-based communication process that forges emotional and intellectual connections between the interests of the audience and meanings inherent in the resource.

Tilden's Principles

- 1. Relate. Compare, contrast, make it personal
- 2. Reveal. Help the visitor discover something new
- 3. Provoke. Inspire profound thought
- 4. Arts. Employ multiple learning styles
- 5. Holistic, Give the resource context (the bigger story)
- 6. Appropriate. Consider the audience

Abraham Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs (1984)

Basic: Physical Comfort (Provide food, beverage, restrooms, or equipment as appropriate), Safety and Security (Be prepared for emergencies)

Intermediate: Belonging (Use names and inclusive language), Esteem (Encourage exchange of ideas)

Advanced: Aesthetics (Leave time to enjoy the resource), Selfactualization (Celebrate peak experiences)





Be stated as a short, simple, complete sentence

Contain only one idea

Reveal the overall purpose of the presentation

Be specific

Be interestingly worded (active verbs)

Include tangibles (concrete) & intangibles (abstract)
