Thanks to Handshake Partnership Program funding, the staff at Raystown lake staff was able to leverage partner volunteers and discounted materials to create 2 new disc golf courses inside the Seven Points Recreation Area at Raystown Lake. The first course, called the Pine 9 Nature Trail Disc Golf Course, is a 9-hole course designed to introduce users to the sport of disc golf. Local disc golf club experts helped plan the course to be accessible for beginners yet still pose a challenge to more experienced players. Kids in Parks designed tee signs with hole information, pro tips to educate beginners, and an interpretive message to share the Corps mission with visitors. The second course, called the Ravine 18, is a more technical woods course with 18 baskets and 2 tee pads for each hole. The Ravine 18 was designed to offer a challenging experience to recreational players up to advanced players and adds a woods style course that did not yet exist in the region.

The Grand opening weekend celebration for both courses took place on the weekend of April 14-16, 2023. The Pine 9 had a soft opening in the fall of 2021 to allow play, but without permanent signage. Once the signs were all in place and the finishing touches completed, the partners came out to celebrate. As part of the opening weekend the USACE partnered with the Huntingdon County Visitors Bureau (HCVB) to hold a formal ribbon cutting ceremony. That ceremony was followed by a weekend tournament was planned and executed by Raystown Area Discgolf in partnership with the HCVB. Just in its first summer since the Grand Opening more than 2,400 rounds have been logged into the UDisc.





The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), Baltimore District, and <u>Huntingdon County Visitors Bureau</u> hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony celebrating the debut of two disc golf courses located at the Seven Points Campground at Raystown Lake, April 14, 2023.

The brand-new disc golf courses, which feature a total of 43 tee pads and 27 baskets, were a result of 600 volunteer service hours and \$25,000 in Handshake Partnership funding - providing "seed money" for USACE facilities that engages local partners for improvements on federal lands. The projects improve recreational opportunities for the public and benefit environmental stewardship, while simultaneously enabling USACE missions.

"From the start, this course was, and will continue to be, a team effort," said Col. Estee Pinchasin, Baltimore District commander. "None of this would be possible without the strong support from our local and regional partners who contributed and share our passion for upkeep and improvement within the Raystown Lake Region."

Partners include <u>Raystown Area Disc Golf</u>, <u>Kids in</u> <u>Parks</u>, <u>Standing Stone Disc Golf Club</u>, <u>Let's Go Throw</u>, and <u>Friends of Raystown Lake</u>.

In recent years, disc golf has grown rapidly throughout the U.S. and abroad. According to <u>UDisc</u>, disc golfers spent 32.6 million

hours on courses in 2022, with an average of 4.3 courses installed nationwide per day.

"If you plan to camp or visit Raystown, bring your discs, or you can get loaner discs at Raystown Reflections inside the visitors center," said Raystown Operations Project Manager Jude Harrington. "If you love outdoor adventures, then Raystown Lake is your oasis."

ABOUT RAYSTOWN LAKE

Raystown Lake is the largest lake located entirely in Pennsylvania and offers 8,300 surface acres of clear water surrounded by 21,000 acres of forested mountain slopes. Raystown is a multi-purpose lake constructed and managed by USACE for flood damage reduction, recreation and natural resource opportunities, and hydropower.
