The Hannibal Locks and Dam Visitor's Center was closed for security reasons immediately after the attacks of September 11, 2001. The building remained unused and fell into disrepair as budget reductions made the maintenance and upkeep of the structure a low priority. The funding provided by the Handshake Partnership Program allowed the center to be completely rehabilitated and re-opened for use by the general public in July 2017.

6. Handshake Program Recipient Feedback

Please take this opportunity to provide feedback on all aspects of the Handshake Program and the Challenge Partnership Agreement authority. Your productive comments are important to the ongoing improvement of the program. Make sure to let us know how the Handshake funds have benefited your efforts to initiate and/or strengthen your partnerships.

At the beginning of the project, there was great enthusiasm by all of the sponsors. It was a very big event for the local community. However, in spite of the communication efforts and In-Progress Reviews (IPRs) by the project staff, some sponsors seemed to have lost interest and their participation dropped off; we attributed this to the overall length of the project. This is the

<u>First</u>, and only, <u>Handshake Partnership ever attempted by the Locks and Dams Branch of the Pittsburgh District</u>. What would be most helpful is that training be provided to <u>Handshake recipients on how to keep sponsors actively engaged once the project starts and ensure that they meet their commitments. Regardless, the project was a huge success. The only drawback is that the Visitor's Center is not ADA-accessible. There may be a future opportunity to apply for another HPP agreement in order to install an outdoor elevator.</u>

7. Handshake Summary:

In response to the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, the Hannibal Locks and Dam Visitor's Center (HVC) was immediately closed as part of the government's increased security posture. For almost 2 decades, the building remained unused and fell into a state of disrepair. Over the subsequent years, budget reductions made the maintenance and upkeep of the structure nearly an impossibility and the HVC became a low priority.

In September 2015, Samuel Wagner (Retired) assisted in drafting and submitting a Handshake Partnership Program (HPP) grant for the rehabilitation of the center. This was the first, and only, Handshake Partnership ever attempted by the Locks and Dams Branch of the Pittsburgh District; before then, HPP grants were widely awarded and used by the district's flood control reservoirs.

Once the grant was received, work immediately started in June 2016 with the entire exterior of the building being scraped and painted by two seasonal GS-03 summer laborers. For the next year, work on the center was completed as the Hannibal staff's time and other duties would allow.

In addition to painting the exterior, major work tasks included replacing the existing roof with a high-durability membrane and sealant and gutting the entire interior of the building due to water intrusion.

Other upgrades took both the environment and safety into consideration. Although an HVAC system did not exist during the original construction, an energy-efficient heating/cooling system was installed for climate control. A specialized UV-resistant film was applied to all of the windows in order to reduce the daytime heat and to protect the static displays from harmful UV-ray deterioration. All walking surfaces were also covered with a non-slip, rubberized coating to help reduce any walking hazards.

Curators from the Ohio Valley River Museum provided river-industry relics and memorabilia spanning over a century of history along the upper Ohio River. An audio-visual interpretive display describing topics from 18th-century riverboat building upriver in Clarington, Ohio to the construction and operation of the modern-era Hannibal Locks and Dam. Other members of the Hannibal staff added their own personal finishing touches such as a hand-crafted leather Visitor's Registry and a homemade nautical-themed stand to place it on.

The funding provided by the Handshake Partnership Program allowed the center to be completely refurbished and re-opened for use by the public in July 2017. Since then, over 5,880 visitors from places as far as Hawaii and Germany have visited and learned of early-American river navigation. The town of Hannibal and its surrounding communities couldn't be prouder.

Background Information

In May of 2016, the Pittsburgh District Army Corps of Engineers signed a first-of-its-kind partnership with a group of local entities here in Monroe County with the goal of bringing new life back into the beautiful grounds and facilities at Hannibal Locks and Dam.

As part of the agreement, the Corps partnered with the Ohio Valley River Museum to design an historical and interactive exhibit within the visitor's center highlighting the historic presence the Army Corps of Engineers have maintained in Monroe County since the early 20th century when the first two dams (Lock 14 above Clarington and Lock 15 below Hannibal) were constructed.

Using a \$25,000.00 grant awarded to Hannibal Locks and Dam by the Army Corps of Engineers, work crews from the dam, along with volunteers from the Ohio Valley River Museum and community, have worked tirelessly to renovate, clean, and restore the visitor's center and surrounding grounds after being closed to the public for the better part of 16 years following the September 11, 2001 attacks.

Today, Hannibal Locks and Dam maintains the most scenic and largest amount of flat grounds of any facilities under the command of the Pittsburgh District. Found on the grounds before you today are historic exhibits, picnic facilities, walking trails, baseball and soccer fields, and unobstructed views of the hills, river, and local scenery.

It is with great pride and joy that we welcome you back to this beautiful facility today and in the future. We appreciate your support, dedication, and spirit to help continue making Hannibal Locks and Dam a place of recreation, historical interest, and relaxation.


