HANDSHAKE PARTNERSHIP 2012-2013

The Corps of Engineers at Paint Creek Lake partnered with the Boys Scouts of America Chapter 5022 to take on the project of coordinating and developing creek access at the downstream recreation area at Paint Creek Dam. Due to recent placement of large armor rock, access to Paint Creek had become difficult. Therefore, this project was developed to provide safe access to the creek for kayakers and canoeists. The project was awarded a Challenge Handshake Grant of \$8500 to undertake the project. Two separate areas were chosen, an upper area to allow access just above a riffle area that is used in rescue training exercises and a lower area that could be used for takeout from the above access or as a put in area to access further downstream. The project has also been a benefit to the angler as the two stepped areas enables easier access to the creek for fishing.

The Handshake funds were used in the purchase of materials, signage and to hire a contractor to operate equipment to prep the area and to install the two step access areas to the river. The boy scouts undertook the project as an Eagle badge effort and developed the design for the access and then assisted in placement of stone once the steps were in place and planted grass seed in the area of the accesses.
