Great Lakes and Ohio River Division Water Safety Initiatives

Buffalo District (LRB)

Two Buffalo District park rangers Cole Schaefer & Thomas Wenzel were presented with the district's Clear Communication Badge for the public tours and information that they provide to thousands of visitors at the Mount Morris Dam and Recreation Area each year, which include water safety messaging and having a positive impact through communication.



The USACE Buffalo District re-marked the location of a submerged stone wall along the inside of Ashtabula Harbor's East Breakwater in Ashtabula, Ohio. The buoys location and purpose, along with additional safety information, has been shared via local marinas, boat ramps, and the U.S. Coast Guard through a Local Notice to Mariners (LNM).

Chicago District (LRC)

J. Edward Roush Lake Manager Wesley Millar and Park Ranger Amber Arena promoted water safety at the Huntington Tails and Trails Festival. 84 direct water safety interpretive contacts were made.





Upper Wabash park manager and park rangers hosted local 7th graders for Career Exploration Day to share about their careers and the paths they took to do what they do.

Detroit District (LRE)

Detroit District hosted SHPO Section 106 staff members for a multi-day tour of the historic shipping locks facilities and construction site for the new Soo Lock. All tours include water safety briefings and proper life jacket wear.



Huntington District (LRH)

Conducted their first ever Trunk or Treat event and it was a success! Approximately 1,600 people attended. Bobber the Water Safety Dog made appearances during the event and with the help of park rangers provided event attendees with water safety information and promotional items.



Mississippi Valley Division Water Safety Initiatives

New Orleans District (MVN)

Atchafalaya Basin Floodway System and Bonnet Carre Spillway Projects

On October 14, 2023, park rangers from Atchafalaya Basin Floodway System and Bonnet Carre Spillway Programs staffed an interactive area at the Wild Things Event that included water safety and project information. This annual event is hosted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service at their headquarters office in Lacombe, LA. Over 1,200 interpretive contacts were made during the





event. Louisiana state agencies and other federal agencies participated in this event too including NASA who distributed glasses to view the solar eclipse that will occur in April 2024.

Bonnet Carre Spillway

Four new Life Ring cabinets were ordered and installed at locations throughout the project. Life jacket loaner stations were cleaned and re-stocked with life jackets.

Atchafalaya Basin Floodway System

Boat patrols were conducted during duck season to provide visitor assistance and to enforce the life jacket wear requirement for all when operating tiller-steer outboard motors. In Louisiana, all persons on board a motorboat less than 16 feet which is being propelled by a hand tiller outboard motor are required to wear a U.S. Coast Guard-approved Type I, II, III or V PFD while the motorboat is underway.

Life jacket loaner stations were cleaned and stocked with life jackets.

The annual commercial crawfish permit for the Atchafalaya Basin Floodway System was updated with water safety messages. The project issues almost 200 special use permits annually and each permit holder is allowed up to 500 crawfish traps.

Rock Island District (MVR)

Saylorville Lake

Park rangers from Saylorville Lake attended a joint training for side-scan sonar, held by the Iowa DNR at Big Creek State Park. Rangers learned how to use our Hummingbird Side-Scan Sonar efficiently and effectively for use in water emergencies. In attendance were other agencies that work around Saylorville Lake that assist in water emergencies.





Park rangers staffed a water safety information table at the Grow Wild Event at the Jester Park Nature Center. A water safety plinko game was provided so participants to the event could win a water safety prize for playing. This event was hosted by Polk County Conservation District and is a family-friendly event for all ages. More than 200 water safety interpretive contacts were made during the event.

On October 7, 2023, Saylorville Lake park rangers staffed a water safety interactive area at the Polk County Sheriff's Office Candy Crawl event. Many other agencies from around the area had safety-themed Halloween displays and demonstrations for all ages. Approximately 150 water safety interpretive contacts were made.





On November 19, 2023, park rangers staffed a water safety information table at the Iowa Wild Pucks-n-Paws hockey game. The information table was setup in the concourse area, which was a great location to talk to game attendees.

Illinois Waterway Project

Park rangers from the Illinois Waterway Visitor Center continued their partnership with the St. Genevieve Paddlewheeler Riverboat in October. The park rangers narrated two tours a day on the river between Ottawa and Utica on October 10, 17, 19, and 24, 2023. These trips involved locking through at Starved Rock Lock and Dam and included important water safety information on how recreational boaters and paddlers should lock through safely.

On October 20, 2023, some students and staff from His Cross Lutheran School visited the Illinois Waterway Visitor Center. They were presented an interpretive program that included information about the Illinois Waterway and how a lock and dam functions and received water safety promotional materials. Since it was a 4th grade class they were also issued America the Beautiful passes.

On November 8, 2023. Park Ranger Sarah Fisher gave a talk about safety right of ways between recreation and commercial vessels on the river at the I & M Canal Corridor Conference held at the Four Rivers Environmental Education Center in Channahon, IL. The center is on the bank of the Des Plaines River just before the confluence with the Illinois River.

On November 21, 2023, Park Ranger Sarah Fisher gave a presentation at the I & M Canal Heritage Corridor Board Meeting. Park Ranger Fisher provided information about the Illinois Waterway Visitor Center, duties conducted on the Illinois River by USACE staff, and water safety. Board members were in attendance from communities as far away as Lemont and Joliet, IL.

Mississippi River Project

On September 28, 2023, park rangers staffed two stations at the Tri-County Conservation Day held at Palisades Park in Savanna, IL. One of the stations was on Navigating the Mississippi River and the other stations was on water safety. At the water safety station students participate in a water safety relay race that included putting on life jackets and throwing a rescue device before racing back in line. 500 area students visit different education stations throughout the day during the event.



On October 18, 2023, Mississippi River Visitor Center volunteer Gene Sperry staffed a water safety table during the "Boo on the Rock" Trunk or Treat event held at the Rock Island Arsenal. Bobber the Water Safety Dog made an appearance during the event. This popular event is open to Arsenal families as well as members of the public and consists of both indoor and outdoor activities.

Lake Red Rock

Purchased ad space to promote water safety in the Pella, IA Travel Guide and the Marion County, IA Travel Guide for the 2024 season.

Lake Red Rock continued its "Water Safety Wednesday" Facebook posts after the recreation season. Most of the social media content was provided via the Please Wear It Facebook page which provides many water safety posts pertinent to all seasons of the year. The Please Wear It Facebook and Instagram pages are managed by the National Water Safety Program in cooperation with The Corps Foundation.



To promote water safety during the holiday season the Lake Red Rock interpretive staff decorated a tree in their visitor center with water safety promotional products that visitors could take with them.







While many fair-weather boaters finish their season around Labor Day, there were still many fishermen that use Lake Red Rock during the fall months. To ensure off-season boaters still have access to life jackets, the life jacket loaner stations at the boat ramps remained stocked with life jackets until the courtesy docks were removed for the season. A volunteer that assisted with the loaner stations' weekly inventory and inspection during the summer continued to check them throughout the cooler months until her volunteer service ended for the year.

St. Louis District (MVS)

Carlyle Lake

Park rangers offered a Bobber the Water Safety Dog Scavenger Hunt as part of the annual Campers & Family Trick-or-Treat event in their Dam West Campground. An estimated 225 children and their families attended the event. Those that reported finding any of the 20 Bobber the Water Safety Dog images that were placed throughout the campground were awarded a water safety bag that included Bobber the Water Safety Dog water safety promotional products provided by the National Water Safety Program.



Posted water safety messages on Illinois Highway 27 digital reader board and on all of their day use information boards.



Promoted water safety while hunting in the 2023 Breese Journal Hunting Guide, which is distributed throughout the entire Clinton County, IL area.

The Carlyle Lake Haunted Trail event was held October 20 and 21, 2023 and the lake staff included haunting water safety displays along the trail. Over 1,600 people attended the event.

The five billboards, located in high visitation areas around Carlyle Lake were changed from summer to winter water safety messages.

Mark Twain Lake

Conducted a walk through trick-or-treat event for all ages in their Indian Creek Campground that was closed for season. The water safety bags and promotional products were provided to all attendees. Four local partners will USACE conduct this event.

Rend Lake

Park rangers partnered the Rend Lake Area Tourism Council to staff a booth at the annual Southern Illinois Hunting and Fishing Days. During the event the park rangers answered questions about USACE and activities at Rend Lake and shared water safety information and promotional products with attendees. 645 interpretive contacts were made during the event.



In October 2023, park rangers staffed water safety interactive areas at several community trick or treat events including the annual Trick or Treat the Campground at Wayne Fitzgerrel State Park and a Trunk or Treat hosted by Rend Lake Marina. Bobber the Water Safety Dog made an appearance at both events, while park rangers shared water safety information and promotional items to attendees.

Park Ranger Breanna Whitley presented "Beavers: Nature's Engineers" interpretive programs that focused on water safety at the Southern Illinois Conservation Fair. 196 water safety interpretive contacts were made during the event.



On October 31, 2023, the Rend Lake staff partnered with local businesses and organizations to host the annual Trick or Treat event at their Visitor Center. This event was open to the public, but specifically designed to meet the needs of pre-k and home school students. The event featured a water safety scavenger hunt, environmental education, and other activities related to USACE missions.

Rivers Project

Lewis and Clark Community College hosted the National Great Rivers Research and Education Center 21st Annual Water Festival in Godfrey, IL. The event connects elementary school students to water, their local environment, and organizations that help conserve the environment. Nine regional schools were in attendance and rotated through various interactive areas including one staffed by Rivers Project park rangers where they conducted a water safety relay with the students. 250 water safety interpretive contacts were made during the event.



Rend Lake

On October 18, 2023, in collaboration with River Works Discovery the National Great Rivers Museum hosted Who Works the River - a free career education event. At this event 200 students participated in a mini career fair and met with representatives from the maritime industry and related fields to become more informed about careers on America's rivers. Water safety practices were mentioned at many of the stations because they are an integral part of working at most of the companies that were at the event.

On October 31, 2023, Rivers Project park rangers participated in the 106th annual Alton Halloween Parade reaching thousands of parade spectators with water safety messages. Their parade float focused on todays pop-culture including Malibu Barbie promoting wearing a life jacket is the best accessory.



On November 3, 2023, a celebration event for the National Great Rivers Museum's 20th anniversary was conducted. Twenty partnering organizations participated in the event. With help from St. Louis District Office staff and staff from other project offices a water safety interactive area was provided and Bobber the Water Safety Dog made special appearances during the event.

Lake Shelbyville


To encourage water safety to visitors during the holiday season Lake Shelbyville Park Rangers decorated a Christmas Tree with Bobber the Water Safety Dog, Corkey, and Sinker ornaments in their visitor center. Copies of the ornaments were made available for visitors to take home. The ornaments were created by the National Water Safety Program and were available on www.Bobber.info for a limited time in December.

Park Ranger Brock Key did a water safety interview with Shelbyville Radio Station, WTIM, that included the dangers of lake ice, the importance of wearing life jackets, and other water safety tips.



Several water safety ads were developed and provided to the Roxy Movie Theater in Shelbyville, IL to play before each movie starts. Every month highlights a different water safety tip.

Park Ranger Erica Nabers worked with Pam Doty, National Water Safety Program Manager and Toby Isbell, National Water Safety Program VI Specialist to have vinyl door wrap artwork created that included Bobber the Water Safety Dog and interactive activities. The door vinyl wraps have been ordered and will be placed on building doors at the beaches around Lake Shelbyville.



Wappapello Lake



On October 14, 2023, Park Ranger Andrew Jefferson and volunteers staffed a water safety booth at Home Depot Safety Day. 226 direct water safety interpretive contacts were made during the event.

The Annual Greenville Jack-O-Lantern Jubilee was held at Greenville Campground in October 2023. Campers decorated their campsites and handed out candy to those that attended the event. Park rangers and volunteers staffed an informational booth that included water safety during the event.








New England District (NAE)

West Hill Dam

Posted this water safety message for hunters "Please wear your safety orange, protect your pets, and if you hunt from a boat, wear your life jacket!"





Partners including USCG Auxiliary, Station Cape Cod Canal, and Flotilla 013-11-08 helped to promote boating safety through multiple collaborative public outreach events and vessel safety sheck opportunities along the canal. Additionally, the USCG Auxiliary secured, installed, and maintain a life jacket loaner station at the Sandwich Marina boat ramp, which is the only boat ramp at the east end of the Cape Cod Canal.

Hopkinton Everett Lakes

Hosted the second annual Hopkinton Fall Festival at Elm Brook Park. Hundreds of visitors came to the park to enjoy cornhole games, live music, food trucks, and a fireworks display presented by the Contoocook Chamber of Commerce and Hopkinton Police Association. Hopkinton Everett Lakes staff utilized the New England District's water safety trailer to teach event attendees how to choose the correct size life jacket, practice throwing a flotation device, and provided water safety promotional items to those that participated in the activities.

Ninety-five students from the Hopkinton 7th grade class visited the dam and Elm Brook Park during a two-day field trip in October 2023. Park Ranger Matt Hackett presented "Sink Fast" water safety interpretive programs at one of the field trip stations were the students participated in learning about water safety and how to choose and properly fit a life jacket.



Hodges Village Dam



On October 14, 2023, a "Walktober" event was held at Hodges Village Dam, which consisted of a 2.2 mile float through a portion of the French River. The event included discussions highlighting water safety and the natural features of the river. All participants doing the float portion of the event had to wear a properly fitted life jacket.

West Thompson Lake

Utilized funding from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) to make some much needed repairs to their boat ramp facility. These improvements included paving a portion of the parking area, improving drainage, and adding five parking spaces for boat trailers, thus improving visitor safety and accessibility to the lake for water-based recreation activities.



Baltimore District (NAB)

Jennings Randolph Lake



Park rangers assisted Bobber the Water Safety Dog in making appearances at the Annual Halloween Event at Jennings Randolph Lake, the Elk Garden Primary School Halloween Parade, and the community Halloween Parade in Elk Garden, WV. Park rangers and Bobber participated in Trunk-or-Treat at these events and walked along during the parades, helping to hand out water safety items.

Northwestern Division Water Safety Initiatives

Kansas City District (NWK)

Pomme de Terre Lake

A Light Up The Lake event was coordinated by the Pomme de Terre Lake Chamber of Commerce and was held at the USACE Damsite Park from December 1-31, 2023. Local businesses and non-profit organizations decorated campsites for the holiday season. The Pomme de Terre Lake staff designed and displayed a water safety message during the event that included wear your life jackets and enjoy the lake during the holiday season.





Portland District (NWP)

John Day Lock and Dam

To kick off the school year, park rangers and other staff visited a local elementary school to present an interpretive program on salmon, hydropower, and water safety. 75 direct water safety interpretive contacts made. Every student received some water safety promotional items as well as an Interagency 4th Grade Pass to promote the Every Kid Outdoors initiative.

In November 2023, Park Ranger Shannon Ritz presented at the Columbia Gorge Discovery Center during their Archeology Roadshow. Attendees of all ages learned about cultural history surrounding the Columbia River, created their own artwork, and participated in water safety activities. Approximately 100 interpretive contacts were made.

Park Ranger Alex Swicegood delivered over 400 water safety bags to community recreation centers, pools, libraries, schools, and daycares throughout Umatilla, Gilliam, and Morrow Counties. These materials will be used this upcoming spring and summer with their outdoor and reading programs that will focus on water safety on Lake Umatilla and Willow Creek Lake. There are plans for John Day Park Rangers to collaborate with local libraries this summer to support their programming initiatives (ie. "Reading with a Ranger") that will have a water safety message component and opportunities to receive water safety promotional materials.

Willamette Valley Project

Several Natural Resource Management staff attended Oregon State University (OSU) and University of Oregon's (UO) career fairs. They were there to recruit students for several positions open in the NRM program at the Willamette Valley Project and share USACE missions. At OSU, 95 direct interpretive contacts were made and students were given a water safety sticker with a beaver on it when they visited the booth. At UO, 65 direct interpretive contacts were made and these contacts were given a water safety sticker with a duck on it. Both University students and staff were very excited to put their new water safety stickers on their water bottles and laptops to show off around campus.



A new event attended this fall was STEM Day in Salem, OR hosted by Girl Scouts of Oregon and Southwest Washington. Park Rangers Paige King and Becca Jones partnered with Salina Hart, Chief of Reservoir Regulation & Water Quality Section to staff a booth at the event. Approximately 380 direct interpretive contacts during the event. The booth display focused on the benefits of dams in the Willamette Valley Project, how hydropower is made, careers in STEM, and water safety. Girl Scouts got to practice putting on life jackets, using a throw rope, and were given water safety materials to take home.





Dam tours picked back up at Lookout Point and Foster Dams. Park rangers stressed water safety awareness during the tours. Tours were provided to local homeschooled groups and watershed classes.

The Dalles Lock and Dam



Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission hosted their annual Trunk or Treat event in The Dalles Lock & Dam Visitor Center parking lot. Park rangers decorated the interior of the Visitor Center for the event and Bobber the Water Safety Dog made a surprise appearance and with assistance from park rangers provided water safety messaging and promotional materials to event attendees.

Seattle District (NWS)

Libby Dam

On October 31, 2023, staff decorated their patrol truck with mannequins, life jackets and other props to help teach local families about water safety at the community Trunk or Treat event. Bobber the Water Safety Dog with assistance form Park Ranger Susan James made an appearance during the event. Water safety tips and information about the loaner life jacket program were shared with event attendees. This is the first year Libby Dam staff participated in this event. Approximately 600 direct water safety interpretive contacts were made.







Walla Walla District (NWW)



On October 7, 2023, Walla Walla District NRM Team staffed an interactive area at RiverFest 2023 at Columbia Park in Kennewick, WA. Information and activities regarding the workings of turbines, improvements of fish survival, and the importance of water safety were provided to event attendees.

Mill Creek

In December 2023, staff and Bobber The Water Safety Dog participated in annual holiday parade in Walla Walla, WA.





South Atlantic Division Water Safety Initiatives

Jacksonville District (SAJ)

Okeechobee Waterway

On October 21, 2023, Park Ranger James Norris of the Southern Florida Operations, Saint Lucie Officeconducted an interpretive program at FireFest held at Jonathan Dickinson State Park in Hobe Sound, FL. Park Ranger Norris provided information on USACE, park ranger duties at the Okeechobee Waterway, and water safety during the program,. Water safety topics that were covered during the program included proper fitting and wear of life jackets, rescue procedure using reach, throw, row, and don't go techniques, and safe boating on the Okeechobee Waterway.





On November 2nd and 3rd, 2023, the Southern Florida Operations, Okeechobee Waterway Park Rangers presented water safety interpretive programs to 250 students during a safety day event. Groups of students were rotated to different stations at the event every 15 minutes. Water safety topics covered by the park rangers during the event included proper fitting and wear of life jackets, throwing a ring buoy, and tips for safe swimming.

On December 6, 2023, Saint Lucie Park Rangers and Bobber the Water Safety Dog met with Sergeant Taylor from the U.S. Marine Corps Florida Reserves for a photo opportunity to promote Toys for Tots and USACE.

Mobile District (SAM)

Alabama River Lakes

October 6 - 15, 2023, park rangers staffed a booth at the Alabama National Fair in Montgomery, AL to promote water safety and the project's parks. 4,100 interpretive contacts were made during the event.



October 30 - November 4, 2023, park rangers staffed a booth at Selma Fair in Selma, AL promote water safety and the project's parks. 600 direct water safety interpretive contacts were made during the event.



West Point Lake

On October 5, 2023, West Point Lake held its 44th annual "Special Day for Special People" event at Rocky Point Recreation Area. This event gave the mentally and physically challenged individuals in the local community a chance to experience outdoor recreation. Activities during the event included boat rides (everyone that went on a boat ride had to wear a life jacket), a photo booth, bouncy castles, music, and food. Bobber the Water Safety Dog made a special appearance to interact with the participants. Over 800 participants showed up for the event, making it one of West Point Lake's largest events of the year.





On October 27, 2023, West Point Project staff participated in a Trunk or Treat event at Fairfax Elementary School in Valley, AL. Park rangers and other staff gave out water safety promotional items to over 660 kids. Bobber the Water Safety Dog was also present to help spread the message of water safety by interacting with the kids.

West Point Park Rangers and Bobber the Water Safety Dog participated in two Christmas parades to promote water safety. On November 30, 2023, Park Rangers Mike Linville and Kevin Parsons, along with Bobber and some helpful volunteers participated in the annual Christmas Parade in LaGrange, GA. Walter F. George Lake



Every year during the months of October and November, Walter F. George Lake partners with the Eufaula Recreation Center in Eufaula, AL to present water safety interpretive programs during swimming lessons to 2nd graders. There were a total of three days that Park Ranger Shannon Schaefer presented water safety programs in conjunction with the swimming lessons. There were three classes each day, typically 20 children per class, that attended the program to learn about the importance of life jackets and proper rescuing techniques.

November 3 - 11, 2023, park rangers and volunteers staffed a booth at the annual National Peanut Festival in Dothan, AL. There were 3,141 interpretive contacts made during the event. During the event they gave away twenty-five donated life jackets to kids in need of a life jacket to use for swimming and boating.

Park rangers, volunteers, other staff, and Buddy Beaver participated in two Christmas parades in 2023 in Abbeville, AL and Blakely, GA. Other parades they participated in during 2023 were in Eufaula, AL and Fort Gaines, GA. The annual Christmas tree at the lake resources management office was decorated by park rangers and volunteers with water safety promotional items, so visitors to the office could take an item from the tree to take home with them.

Savannah District (SAS)

Hartwell Lake

Park rangers presented career day and water safety interpretive programs at North Hart and South Hart Elementary Schools in Hartwell, GA reaching over 400 students. In November 2023, thirty-five McCormick County High School students came to Hartwell Lake to learn about water safety, project history, and USACE careers.





Wilmington District (SAW)

John H. Kerr Lake



Comments from Park Ranger Braaten regarding the game. The first rule of interpretation is steal and make it your own. After all, why reinvent the wheel if you don't have to. That's exactly what I did when I saw the Pittsburgh District's Facebook post using this cornhole style game to promote water safety during their Lock Fest event. The game gave visitors the opportunity to practice throwing a rescue throw bag. I immediately reached out to Nichol Govan in the Pittsburgh District who got me in contact with James Burford who built it. James walked me through what he did and gave me some rough estimates on sizes. He didn't have a drawing because he built theirs out of scrap wood, so I put together the specs shown below. The game is very big, 4 foot by 6 foot, and heavy. The hole is 20 inches in diameter so it's not too difficult to get the throw bag in it. Remember, the goal is to teach people how to get a throw bag and its rope near someone in the water. To help transport the game, I attached two removable 12" lawn mower wheels to the sides and handles on the top outer edge. Because of its size and weight, plan on having two people move it. I built two of these and plan on using them at outreach events and water safety interpretive programs. Let the games begin!



Greers Ferry Lake

National Water Safety Program Resources and Initiatives

Required Water Safety Training for Employees and Volunteers

One change in the new Safety Manual, effective date of 15 March 2024, is that the following has been added to Chapter 1.

Chapter 1-3. Personnel Required Qualification/Training.

- (7) Employees and volunteers that work around water must be provided basic water safety training to include the following:
 - (a) The "Reach, Throw, Row, Don't Go" method.
- (a-1) Reach. Hold on to the dock or your boat and reach your hand, a boat oar, a fishing pole, or whatever you have nearby, to the person.
 - (a-2) Throw. If you cannot reach far enough, toss things that float for the person to grab.
- (a-3) Row. If you are in a boat, use the oars to move the boat closer to the person in the water, or call out to a nearby boat for help. Do not operate the boat's motor close to a person in the water, they could be injured by the propeller.
 - (a-4) Don't Go. Do not go into the water unless you are trained. Call for help.
 - (b) Hazards associated with working around water (for example, temperature, depth, current)
- (c) Hands-on training on how to use rescue equipment (for example, throw rings and bags) and personal protective equipment (PPE) (for example, personal flotation devices (PFD)) properly.

Information put together by the National Water Safety Program that can be used during water safety training is in the NRM Gateway Water Safety Section under Training and Conferences.





Fatalities summary infographic, one page summary sheets for USACE and every division, division fatality totals spreadsheet, line graph of USACE water-related fatalities since 1971, and USACE Public Recreation Fatalities Dashboard are also provided on the NRM Gateway.

Our target audience is adult males (18 and older) not wearing life jackets because our statistics from FY98-23 show that 88% of our public recreation fatalities were male, 82% were 18 and older, and 89% were not wearing a life jacket. Ten year statistics (FY14-23) show that 88% of our public recreation fatalities were male, 86% were 18 and older, and 89% were not wearing a life jacket, so please focus on promoting water safety to adult males and increasing life jacket wear.

On March 27, 2010, Brian and his son, Nathan, headed out for a fun day of fishing. Complying with Missouri law, life jackets were onboard but not worn because that state only requires children under seven to wear them. The boat capsized tossing both father and son into cold water. Neither survived

Connor Gage 1997-2012

On August 31, 2012, Connor went to a friend's birthday party at a lake house and didn't come home. Connor was a lake kid and an excellent swimmer. He and his friends got permission to swim. Connor jumped from a boat dock, landed badly, and didn't resurface.

Ryan Swain 1996-2013

On September 7, 2013, Ryan and three friends were duck hunting from the bank of a lake.

Rvan waded out to retrieve a duck and for unknown reasons, went under in only six feet of water.



Message from the Swain Family Regardless of age or physical abilities, no one is immune to the dangers of water.









Andy Free

2011-2020

On June 6, 2020, Andy and his family enjoyed the day boating and after a day at the rear of the boat Andy fell unconscious into the lake and never woke up again. It was later revealed that Andy died of carbon monoxide poisoning Tragically, Andy's life was cut short by carbon monoxide, which is a colorless, odorless, and tasteless toxic gas.
