

Lake Red Rock Project



Lake Red Rock continued its "Water Safety Wednesday" Facebook posts after the recreation season. Most of the content was provided via the Please Wear It Facebook page which offers many messages pertinent to all seasons of the year.

Lake Red Rock purchased ad space in the Pella Travel Guide and the Marion County Travel Guide for the 2025 season to share a water safety message with potential lake visitors. Both ads promoted the various life jacket loaner stations available in the parks. The Pella Travel Guide ad featured members Pella's Central College football team wearing life jackets!

Interpretive staff took part in the new Fire Safety event at Pleasantville Elementary School on October 7th. While the lake's booth at the event focused on being safe around campfires in conjunction with the event's theme, staff shared various water safety giveaway items to the young participants and their families.



To incorporate a water safety message during the holiday season, interpretive staff set up a tree in the visitor center decorated with water safety key chains, various boats and other



nautical ornaments, mini life jackets made from craft foam, stickers, decoupaged ornaments with water safety messages, pens, and other related items.

While many fair-weather boaters finish their season around Labor Day, there are still many fishermen that use the lake during the fall months. To ensure off-season boaters still have access to life jackets, the PFDs at Corps managed boat ramp loaner stations remained available until the courtesy docks were removed for the season. Many off-season boaters are men that fit the demographic age of the most common drowning victims (men aged 18-54, in smaller watercraft, boating alone).

Coralville Lake Project

Coralville Lake Park Rangers conducted multiple project tours where students learned about Water Safety, the Devonian Fossil Gorge, and Coralville Lake History. 4 different schools participated with over 265 students taking part in the programs. The instruction included dam safety, warning students about the dangers of water and swimming near dams.





Park Rangers improved the 7 permanent life jacket loaner stations across the Coralville Lake Project. Upgrades included new hooks for life jackets, allowing for easier access for users, and room for life jacket donations. In addition, new signs were designed and implemented, showcasing clearer instructions and an easier-to-read format. The placement of the signs on the life jacket loaner stations established a dedicated area for the posting of custom monthly water safety messages.



Coralville Lake Park Rangers conducted in person classroom visits where students learned about Water Safety and the "Role of a Park Ranger". There were 152 students who took part in the programs. The instruction within classrooms included water safety activities, which engaged the students and helped them retain the information.

Mississippi River Project

On September 16, Mississippi River Project Rangers presented navigation and water safety programs at the Tri-County Conservation Day in Savanna, IL. This is a multi-agency event where classes rotate around to different presenters in the park throughout the day. At the Corps location students learned about properly wearing a life jacket and how large vessels such as towboats navigate the locks on the Mississippi River. As an added bonus, all 4th grade students attending received an Every Kid Outdoors pass.

In October, Shady Creek and Thomson
Causeway recreation areas held Trick or Treat
events. During these events, roads are
temporarily closed so families can safely Trick
or Treat throughout the campgrounds. Rangers
and volunteers are also busy handing out water
safety goodies and other treats.



On October 23, operators from
Locks and Dam 15 staffed a water
safety table at the Rock Island
Arsenal's Boo on the Rock Trunk or
Treat Event. Different military
commands on base set up
Halloween themed booths both
inside and outside Heritage Hall
that families can trick or treat at.

Illinois Waterway Project

This fall concluded the 2024 Lock and Lunch tour series with the Ste Genevieve Antique Paddle-wheeler Riverboat. Due to popularity, tours this fall were increased from monthly to weekly, with Illinois Waterway River Rangers providing interpretation and Water Safety information to approximately 1,000 passengers. Passengers depart from Ottawa, IL and lock through Starved Rock Lock and Dam on their way to disembark at Starved Rock State Park. A second group of passengers boards the boat at the State Park and takes the boat back through the lock and up to Ottawa, IL. The boat holds approximately 120 people, for a total of up to 240 guests per day.









Monitored Lock Traffic in order to award "I Got Caught" certificates and giveaways. There was a large presence of "Loopers" completing the Great Loop throughout the fall. Due to temporary closures of several locks on the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway, Looper traffic came through later this



The Illinois Waterway Visitor Center continued to promote the USACE Jr Ranger Booklet. Booklets are available online, and there are always several copies printed out behind the desk for individuals wanting to participate. We had multiple families complete their Jr Ranger certificates, with one family of 5 participating that had done over 100 other Jr Ranger programs throughout federal lands. We found an old cache of the Jr Ranger Patches, and started giving those out alongside the Jr Ranger plastic badges that are otherwise available at our site.

Saylorville Lake

Ranger Phipps participated in the Fishing with the Fuzz event at Easter Lake. The activity was sponsored by the Des Moines Police Department and offered youth the opportunity to fish and have some fun. Police officers as well as conservation officers from the Iowa DNR assisted kids with fishing and measuring their catch for the chance to win prizes. USACE assisted with providing life jackets for water safety purposes on the docks, helped remove fish from hooks, and distributed water safety freebies.

Ranger Phipps delivered a presentation highlighting USACE efforts in water safety and the programs available to the community. This presentation showcased the Corps' commitment to promoting safety and preventing injuries through education and outreach.

Ranger Phipps hosted a group of Girl Scouts at the Saylorville Lake Visitor Center, where the scouts learned about water safety, local wildlife, and the lake's ecosystem. This provided a valuable opportunity for the girls to explore the lake and deepen their understanding of natural resources,

inspiring them to become responsible stewards of the environment. While the girls came to learn about the lake and local wildlife, a water safety lesson was added on. They learned how to properly fit a life jacket, as well at the principles of Reach, Throw, Row, Go for Help.



ST. PAUL DISTRICT (MVP)



Mississippi Headwater's Project, Cross Lake Recreation Area - Crosslake Days takes place throughout the city of Cross Lake every fall with family activities, music, and a townwide chili cookoff. Project staff, volunteers, and volunteers with Paul Bunyan Scenic Byway help serve chili and also give a water safety message to all the visitors along with handing out water safety goodies.



Project staff visited a local elementary school to give out 68 EKO passes to 4th grade students. Water safety was discussed with the students and the movie Safe Passage was played while passes were disbursed.

The St. Paul District water safety team designed water safety zip top bags which are intended to target the adult male audience.
Rangers will utilize the bags as a tool to engage visitors at fish cleaning stations, boat landings, and other locations about water safety. The baggies can be used for fish fillets, dry storage, etc.






Clarence Cannon Dam and Mark Twain Lake Project



The 2024 Halloween Walk was a huge success. The dedication and efforts of the USACE team and 4 contributing partners resulted in an attendance over 8,000. The FOREST Council, Ralls County health Department, Missouri Department of Conservation and the M.W. Boudreaux Visitor Center and Educational Resource Committee along with countless volunteers made this popular event successful. Tickets for the event sold out and campsites for the event booked within 4 hours. Partners utilize the proceeds from the ticket sales to fund special events throughout the year to include the Clarence Cannon Dam Firework Show, Kids Fishing Day, Ben Sapp Memorial Shed Hunt, Fish Habitat, Annual Halloween Walk and Live Exhibits at the Visitor Center.

It is done in partnership with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and Friends of Wappapello Lake Association.



On 12, 19, and 26 October 2024 Friends of Wappapello Lake Association in partnership with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers staffed a booth at the Greenville Jack O Lantern Jubilee which was held in the Greenville Campground. Campers decorated their campsites and recreational vehicles as part of the festivities. All visitors who dared to show up received water safety goody bags and plenty of candy. 8,264 attended.



Rend Lake

The Rend Lake team partnered with local businesses and organizations to host the annual Trick or Treat the Visitor Center on Tuesday, October 29. This event was open to the public but specifically designed to meet the needs of pre-k, home school, and special needs participants. The event featured a water safety scavenger hunt, environmental education, and other activities that interpreted agency missions.



The Rend Lake ISOP team participated in the annual Southern Illinois Conservation Fair. Park Ranger Breanna facilitated the "Beavers: Nature's Engineers" program that focused on water safety at lakes and other reservoirs as well as STEM education.







As part of the Every Kid Outdoors program, the Rend Lake ISOP team has been traveling to schools to promote recreation at water safety. Park Ranger Breanna visited Giant



City School on November 15 for a Life Jacket Engineering program in the 4th grade classroom. 19 students worked in teams to design, construct, and test various life jacket designs. In December, the students took a field trip to the Rend Lake Visitor Center to learn more about several agencies missions including water safety.





Rivers Project Office

Through Lewis and Clark Community College, the National Great Rivers Research and Education Center (NGRREC) hosted Water Festival on Wheels, a mobile version of the beloved Water Festival for 5th grade students. The event connects elementary school students to water, their local environment, and organizations that help conserve the environment. Several regional schools participated in Water Festival on Wheels through attending a field day at schools and a community science fair.

The Rivers Project relaunched the Every Kid Outdoors (EKO) Field Day this fall at the Riverlands Migratory Bird Sanctuary as well as expanded the program to Clarksville, Missouri at Lock and Dam #24. The EKO program provides 4th grade students the opportunity to visit public lands through providing free bus transportation and an 'America the Beautiful' pass, all while inspiring a future generation of stewards for the Nation's public lands. 396 fourth grade students across 17 classes and 6 school districts attended 2 separate field days in West Alton and Clarksville, MO in October 2024. Five USACE Teams were represented throughout the field day activities – Education, Recreation, Wildlife, Forestry, and Navigation – while 6 State, Federal, and Nonprofit Organizations partnered to present activities. Field day activities included: Canoeing with Big Muddy Adventures, wildlife presentations, fishing and casting practice, archery, birding, lock tours at LD#24, and water safety relays.







The Rivers Project has relaunched and reimagined the beloved 'Corps Kids' program, formerly called 'River Rangers', serving the regional Riverbend Head Start & Family Services which provides early childhood education for income-eligible families. ISOP Rangers visit preschool classes quarterly to provide an activity relating to USACE missions; Forestry, Water Safety, and Wildlife. At the end of the school year students will attend a special ceremony to receive a 'Corps Kid' badge and certificate. On 26 November, Rangers provided the Water Safety lesson of this program to approximately 120 pre-school students. The lesson included a Sesame Street story book about density, a sink or float demonstration/game, and a Bobber the Water Safety Dog coloring craft.
