# Lake Red Rock Project





Lake Red Rock purchased ad space for a water safety message in the lowa Sportsman magazine's April issue. The "ad" highlights the importance of wearing life jackets year-round, no matter the water sport and features men in the 18-54 year old demographic. The magazine is posted online in electronic format, mailed to their subscribers, and copies will also be distributed at the lowa Deer Classic in Des Moines (March 2025) and at Pheasant Fest in Kansas City (March 2025).

Planning for Red Rock's annual Outdoor Days got underway this winter, an event scheduled in May. The three-day event for area 5th-6th graders features five activity stations of which a water safety station is included. Staff from the Iowa DNR, Marion County Conservation Board, Missouri River Energy Services partner with USACE on the effort. Five schools from throughout Marion County have signed up to participate this year.





Lake Red Rock continued its "Water Safety Wednesday" Facebook posts during the winter season. Most of the content was provided via the Please Wear It Facebook page which offers many messages pertinent to all seasons of the year.

# Coralville Lake Project



Bobber the Water Safety
Dog and park rangers
attended 2 hockey games
around the Coralville Lake
surrounding area. The first
was the Heartlander's in
Coralville, and the second
was the RoughRiders in
Cedar Rapids. Bobber and
rangers spoke with visitors
and was on the ice for
mascot games and to help
get the crowd involved in
the game. Over 2,800
contacts were made.



Park Rangers attended the Cedar Rapids Outdoor Show to promote Coralville Lake, deliver a water safety message, and hand out water safety promotional items. There were 356 contacts made over the weekend.





Coralville Lake staff attended a community event, Freeze Fest to promote water safety and hand out various water safety items. There were 181 people contacted at the event.



Mississippi River Project

On December 14, Bobber attended a Quad City Storm hockey game. Bobber met with fellow mascots to celebrate the team mascot Radar's birthday. Even though the water is frozen at a hockey game, Bobber still went around with a Park Ranger to promote the importance of water safety. There were approximately 5,000 people in the crowd and they were quite excited when all the mascots got on the ice for a short game of broomball.

Park Rangers promoted water safety during various Bald Eagle watching events in January and February. Rangers helped visitors spot eagles along the Mississippi River while also ensuring they stayed safe near the water's edge. Some of the events also had informational booths where water safety giveaways were handed out. Events were held in Clinton, IA; Fulton, IL; LeClaire, IA; Rock Island, IL; Muscatine, IA; and Quincy, IL. A total of 2,461 direct contacts were made.





Natural Resources Specialists staffed a water safety booth during back-to-back weekends at this year's Outdoor and RV Camping shows at the QCCA Expo Center in Rock Island, IL on February 13-16 and 21-23. The events attract outdoor enthusiasts with an interest in boating, fishing, hunting and camping. Staff at the Corps booth were available to answer questions about the project, promote upcoming events and hand out water safety giveaways. Upper Mississippi River Navigational Charts, Annual Day Use and America the Beautiful Passes were also available for interested customers. During both events a total of 2,352 direct customer contacts were made.



On February 14, a Park Ranger presented a Life on a Towboat program to a homeschool group in Osco, IL. The program focuses on navigation on the Mississippi River, how locks and dams work and concludes with dressing students up as members of a towboat crew. A key part of this program is the safety of the crew. We have the students demonstrate how to properly fit and wear a life jacket and go over some basic safety measures. 40 students and parents attended the program.

Illinois Waterway Project

Eagle Watch Weekend YMCA Youth: Project Coordinated and hosted a Bird of Prey program at the local YMCA for almost 600 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students from area schools. Over 500 Every Kid in a Park passes were issued to local 4<sup>th</sup> graders. Every student in attendance received a Safe Passages Book, Flying Ring, and Jr Ranger sticker.





Eagle Watch Weekend Kids Packet: In coordination with the Heritage Corridor, contributed water safety materials to 160 families through take-home activity kits handed out at Eagle Watch Weekend. Eagle Watch Weekend is an event that was started in 1998, and this year over 2,200 individuals visited the Illinois Waterway Visitor Center. Water Safety materials were on display for any visitor who wished to take them. The kids drawing and activity table was also available.

Partnership with Starved Rock Country
Welcome Center: Water Safety giveaways
continue to be regularly supplied to the
Heritage Corridor Welcome Center, a local
visitor center in downtown Utica, IL. Bobber
Water Safety Bags are provided to their gift
shop, so that people making purchases there
receive their purchase in a Bobber Bag. They
also give away Flying Rings among other
various Water Safety items.

The Illinois Waterway Visitor Center will be teaching 6 boater safety courses in the summer of 2025. They take place on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of every month from April through September.

Advertisements for the course were taken out in 3 area publications, Starved Rock Country Magazine, LaSalle County Visitors Guide, and Travel Starved Rock magazines. The advertisements will run in the spring and summer issues of the publications.





Saylorville Lake

The new publication of the Saylorville Lake Area Recreation Guide is now out and available for the public. Inside the recreation guide is information about the lake and recreation areas in the vicinity. However, one of the most important things in the recreation guide is the water safety ad and information about life jacket loaner stations! Each year a water safety ad is included in the guide to promote water safety, not only at Saylorville Lake but around the area as well. The article about life jacket loaner stations provides information about the loaner stations, where to find them, and how they benefit the public.

Winter weather allows for Park Rangers to catch up on life jacket inventory and maintenance for life jacket loaner stations. Each life jacket is inspected for rips, tears, functioning zippers and clips, and to make sure the foam inside the life jackets is still firm and usable.

Park Rangers at Saylorville Lake have submitted the yearly Sea Tow Foundation Grant for life jacket loaner stations. This grant allows Rangers to regularly stock and maintain the life jacket loaner stations with life jackets provided by the Sea Tow Grant. Decisions for 2025 Grant applicants will be made in early April 2025 for delivery in May 2025. If selected, our project will be able to keep stations stocked with life iackets in various sizes available for boaters to borrow free of charge for the day, promoting safety on the water.



# ST. PAUL DISTRICT (MVP)

Mississippi Headwater's Project, Cross Lake Recreation Area – Winterfest Event: Winterfest is a city-wide community event where businesses prepare soup for the public as part of a competition. Cross Lake Recreation Area Staff, in partnership with Paul Bunyan Scenic Byway (PBSB), prepared and served nearly 200 visitors soup, s'mores, and hot chocolate. As part of this event, Park Rangers hosted a water safety coloring contest in which the winners of 4 different age groups got to pick out a new life jacket, donated by the PBSB. Volunteers and Park Rangers also hosted a t-shirt coloring activity in which kids had the opportunity to color and create their own water safety t-shirt.



Mississippi Headwater's Project, Sandy Lake Recreation Area – Kids Fishing Day event:

USACE staff participated in a winter Kids Fishing Day on Hanging Kettle Lake put on by the Aitkin County Sheriff Department. Local law enforcement created several stations on the lake where 5<sup>th</sup> graders from local schools could learn about different ice-related activities – ice fishing, ice auger use, and ice/water safety. USACE Rangers gave a brief discussion about ice safety and rescue procedures and then students were given the opportunity to use ice picks to simulate a self-rescue by lying flat, picking, Army crawling, and kicking along the ice surface to disperse body weight and simulate a self-rescue. Students were allowed to "ice pick race" against one another for fun.

Mississippi Headwater's Project, Gull Lake Recreation Area – Special Olympics Winter Carnival:

On Thursday, February 13, 2025, Park Rangers
Brian Turner and Ellie Tabako brought Bobber
to Confidence Learning Center to spread
water safety messaging at their annual
Special Olympics Winter Carnival. Student
Athletes of all ages were reminded of the
importance of wearing their life jacket and
how to be safe on the frozen lakes. Water
safety towels and flying rings were provided to
200 athletes who met with Bobber.



# Carlyle Lake

The groundwork for the yearly "I Got Caught" campaign commenced in March, rallying support from nearby businesses of the Carlyle Lake Project. This season, we've secured over 30 partners who've joined hands in our efforts. As part of our collaboration, each partner will have their business name prominently featured on t-shirts to be distributed among summer visitors adhering to life jacket safety protocols.





USACE water safety messages were applied to Carlyle Lake's utility vehicle to promote water safety awareness while patrolling day-use areas and campgrounds around Carlyle Lake.



Water safety messages, provided by the National Water Safety Program, were posted to the Carlyle Lake Project Facebook and Instagram pages generating a total of 11 posts with a reach of 87 (likes, comments, and shares).





Water safety messages were displayed on the digital reader board along Illinois Highway 27 and were also prominently featured on all bulletin boards designated for day-use activities resulting in a total of 104 static unique contacts for the quarter.



## Rend Lake

The Rend Lake ISOP team hosted a "Build Like a Beaver" Small World Program, where rangers explained how beavers live near water and the importance of staying safe around it. While participants built beaver dams, rangers discussed how beavers build dams to protect themselves from strong currents, similar to how we use safety measures like life jackets to stay safe around water. There were 40 participants.





The Rend Lake ISOP team participated in a career day at Benton High School and shared the story of the "Many Hats of the Corps". The team emphasized the role of USACE Rangers in educating the public about water safety and facilitated water safety trivia.

messages.

The Rend Lake team hosted the annual Holiday Celebration Small World Program for children ages 5 and younger. During the event, Santa's helper and Bobber the Water Safety Dog shared Bobber activity books, while Santa handed out Bobber's Water Safety books to all the participants.

Rangers also reminded everyone about the importance of never playing on icy lakes and ponds. 71 children and their family members attended.





# Rivers Project Office


In partnership with Meeting of the Rivers Foundation, Mississippi River Water Trail Association, and several other local organizations the Rivers Project presented the fourth annual Ice Jam at the Dam at the National Great Rivers Museum. On 15 February nearly 800 visitors attended the family-focused event. Attractions included open tours of Melvin Price Locks and Dam, live animal presentations, live music, winter-themed educational booths, and visits from Bobber the Water Safety Dog and mascots Louie and Blazer of the St. Louis Blues and Lewis & Clark Community College, respectively. Open tours of Melvin Price brought visitors to the top of the structure to learn about the Navigational Channel and how it can change when the Mississippi River freezes over in the winter. Additionally, a special water safetythemed Polar Passport was granted to children who visited the 10 educational booths.



Rivers Project Rangers participated in Little Creek Nature Area's (LCNA) 'First Saturday' public event on 1 Feb which focused on survival skills. LCNA is a unique 97acre outdoor educational facility owned and operated by the city Ferguson serving the regional school districts with outdoor educational

opportunities. Rangers partnered with the educators from the Audubon Center at Riverlands to teach students and their families, approximately 120 contacts, the importance of life jackets and 'Reach, Throw, Row, Don't Go' through a water safety obstacle course. Other survival skill activities included fire-making, knot tying, and navigating.

Weekly #WaterSafetyWednesday, holiday-themed messaging,
