Jayden is non-verbal, but as April says, "fishing doesn't show her disability, it just shows her freedom." According to Mom, the freedom Jayden gains at C.A.S.T. events is a big deal, "experiencing boating and fishing allows Jayden to be captivated by the wonder of a day on the water, and free from her disability for a while,

it's so awesome." Some of Jayden's favorite things to do in the boat are petting the fish after they are caught and playing with them in the livewell. "She also loves the wind in her face during the boat ride," said April.

The Craig's boat captain for the day was Kevin Pangle. A resident of Bend, OR, Pangle is one of the many members of the Central Oregon Bass Club that volunteered as boat captains at the event. "Kevin was really good and patient with Jayden", said April. Pangle has volunteered at several C.A.S.T. events over the years. When asked for a quote about his day with Jayden and the Craigs, he said "it was the highlight of my year."

"Jayden comes alive during a C.A.S.T. for Kids event" said April. "She started speaking today in the boat and said "happy" several times. She also said 'bye-bye' to the fish we let go. We caught about a dozen bass in three hours. There was therapy as well, and signing practice as I was able to work with her on some new sign language." Jayden
