Nimrod-Blue Mountain Project Office hosted campers from the Boy Scouts of America on an island in Blue Mountain Lake. The Scouts spent the entire week on the island, which is designated as a primitive camping area. The sixteen Scouts spent the week receiving blocks of instructions on various activities within their area of study. Our Project Forester conducted a presentation that blended pillars of our Environmental Stewardship Program: Forestry, Fish and Wildlife Management, and Soil and Water Conservation. Additionally, the scouts volunteered a total of 32 hours picking up trash that had been thrown out or left behind on the island. Despite the heat, these Troops had a fun week and learned valuable information. They plan on adopting the island and returning several times a year to help keep it clean.
