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2025 Handshake Program Funding Recipients

The Handshake Program offers a source of seed money to U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) lakes/rivers for worthwhile partnership projects. The intent of this program is to enhance existing recreation opportunities and natural resources by providing an incentive to USACE projects to utilize partnering initiatives to their fullest potential by combing funding from local USACE projects and their partners to benefit the public.

Six projects selected for 2025 Handshake funding are:

- Arcadia Lake: Mountain bike trail improvements
- Atwood Lake: Habitat enhancement and linking MUR USACE to the Motus Wildlife Tracking System Network
- Coralville Lake: Amphitheater restoration
- Cordell Hull Lake: TRACK trail development
- Kaw Lake: Pavilion construction
- Raystown Lake: Portable invasive species boat washing station

The Mississippi River Water Trail Association (MRWTA) at the Rivers Project Office in the St. Louis District has been selected as the 2024 Excellence in Partnerships Award recipient. Since 2005, the St. Louis community and the Mississippi River have benefited from their efforts with over 20,000 volunteer hours, \$180,000 in professional services, and \$50,000 of materials and equipment donated, bringing their total partnership value to over a half million dollars. It is the shared mission of the River's Project and the MRWTA to create safe, accessible opportunities for lifelong enjoyment of paddling on the Mississippi River.

The Excellence in Partnerships Award annually recognizes exceptional contributions by a partner providing substantial support to the USACE Recreation and Environmental Stewardship programs.


Leave No Trace 2025 Spotlight Program

Our partners at Leave No Trace have selected four USACE lakes for their 2025 Spotlight program. Sites that are selected will receive 3 days of activation put on by the Subaru/Leave No Trace Traveling Teams that can include service projects, staff and community training, community outreach, and youth programs.

USACE sites include:

- April 10-12, 2025: Riverlands Migratory Bird Sanctuary, MO May 15–17, 2025: John H Kerr Reservoir, VA
- June 5-7, 2025: Jennings Randolph Lake, WV
- June 13-15, 2025: Bonneville Lock and Dam, OR/WA

Request for nominations for the 2026 programs will be announced in late July/early August.



New National Cooperative Agreement Signed with the Student Conservation Association (SCA)



USACE has entered into a new master national cooperative agreement with SCA under the authority of Sec 213(a) of WRDA 2000. This authority allows USACE to enter into cooperative agreements with non-federal public or nonprofit entities for services related to natural resource conservation or recreation management of Civil Works projects to further training and educational opportunities. The new agreement with SCA is set up for one year plus four option years and is being administered by the Fort Worth District.

When considering a volunteer or group of volunteers to receive a coin, be prepared to answer the following questions as a guide.

- How did this volunteer or volunteer group go beyond other volunteer's efforts?
- How did they work with partners to improve recreation, environmental conditions or visitor interpretive facilities?
- How did the volunteer or group contribute significantly to public understanding of USACE?
- Did the volunteer or group help keep an area remain open that would have otherwise been closed?
- How did the volunteer or group contribute to natural resource conservation?

You will need to provide a short write-up and some photos on the nomination form to your Division PAC team representative to request a coin.

Blue Marsh Love Your Lake Event

"On Friday July 19th, 2024, Blue Marsh Lake hosted the 4th annual Love Your Lake event for Lake Appreciation Month. Participating local partners included the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, PA Lake Management Society, Penn State Extension Master Watershed Stewards, Berks Nature, Tulpehocken Creek Watershed Association, Aqua Om Paddle, Reading Hospital, and Mount Pleasant Volunteer Fire Department.

Park Rangers and partners educated the public on several aspects of environmental education and outdoor recreation safety including watershed education, water safety, harmful algal blooms, aquatic invasive species prevention, native wildlife around the project, and paddle board demos.

This year, Aqua Om Paddle organized kayak and stand-up paddleboard (SUP) races on the lake with a raffle to win a SUP which attracted new people from the area. Races of 0.25 mi, 1 mi, and 2 mi were held and benefitted PA Lake Management Society. The event concluded with an evening/moonlight paddle.

Moody Access Area Enhancements

Dale Hollow Lake maintains and operates Moody Access Recreation Area, located in Celina, TN. The recreation area consists of 3 fishing piers and a boat launch providing key access to the Obey River. This area is a renowned trout fishery and is routinely stocked by the US Fish and Wildlife Service, Dale Hollow National Fish Hatchery. The area is utilized by over 20,500 annual visitors. Prior to the enhancement project, all fishing piers were in poor condition and becoming dilapidated, with no pier up to accessibility standards. The roadway and shoreline were eroding and sloughing creating a potential safety hazard and threatening the integrity of the piers.

The handshake agreement and contributions from volunteers and partners such as Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, Music City Trout Unlimited, Friends of Dale Hollow Lake, and Clay County government in cooperation with USACE made enhancements to this area possible. Installation of new signage was performed in conjunction with the lake's friends' group, Friends of Dale Hollow Lake, and volunteers were utilized in removal of the old fishing piers.

Moody Access Continued

This opportunity allowed both USACE and the partners to work together on-site to complete a needed project for the community. With partner contributions, riprap was installed to prevent further erosion and new fishing piers were constructed. One pier was constructed with concrete to ensuring that it will be long lasting and sustainable, another was refurbished following ADA guidelines to ensure accessible use to the public.

This project increased safety and ease of use for recreators. This partnership has further enhanced the USACE reputation as the leading provider of outdoor recreational opportunities in the area.

Greater Ukiah Business and Tourism Alliance Partnership

On October 25, 2024 Lake Mendocino held a community event aimed at celebrating its new public/private partnership with the Greater Ukiah and Tourism Alliance (GUBTA). District Commander LTC Shebesta signed an agreement in August with the aim of increasing awareness of Lake Mendocino as a recreation destination and resource. The event included several keynote speakers including Poppy Burkead and Katrina Kessen, as well as dance performances and a ribbon-cutting ceremony. "Our job is to build and maintain projects, so we're pleased to be able to partner with GUBTA to handle the marketing and promotion for all the recreation activities available at Lake Mendocino," said Burkhead. Lake Mendocino/GUBTA staff will work to transform a former campground into a destination park.



VoluInteer.gov Improvement: Addition of Team Members

Starting in April, volunteer coordinators at the project level will be able to access the Salesforce administrative website for Volunteer.gov as "Team Members." Team Members will be able to perform most of the administrative functions that a licensed District volunteer coordinator can do, with the exception of creating and posting new opportunities. Functions accessible to Team Members include: accessing applications and updating their status, onboarding new volunteers, and electronically signing OF301a Volunteer Service Agreement forms online.

ORV Area Improvements

USACE and Midwest Krawlers Club partnered to make much needed improvements to the Off-Road Vehicle (ORV) area located at Tuttle Creek Lake. The only restroom facility in the area prior to the partnership was a single stall vault toilet that was insufficient for the amount of use in the area. The main parking lot was also in need of repair due to erosion through the area, making it difficult for trucks and trailers to navigate. The Midwest Krawlers generously provided funds to pay for the crane service and concrete needed to address these issues. USACE provided equipment and labor to facilitate the work. Lake staff will continue to make improvements to the area to ensure its continued enjoyment for the many ORV users who visit.

New Partnership and Volunteer Program Photo Contest

New Partnership & Volunteer Authorities

With the passing of the Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) of 2024, the USACE NRM program has received two new authorities to expand our capabilities to work with partners and volunteers:

- Volunteer recognition:
 Allows for expenditure of appropriated funds on volunteer recognition items and award ceremonies
- Cooperative management: Expands authority to cooperatively manage recreation areas with nonprofits and provides full use of the RIS reservation system by the partner.

South Florida Operations Volunteer Program

East side and West side Ranger Staff get together biannually as a team with new and returning volunteers to hold a South Florida Operations volunteer training. A wide array of rotational topics are covered such as:

- CPR/AED/First Aid,
- Interactive team building exercises,
- Safety,
- USACE mission,
- Communicating with the public,
- Visitor center(s) and contact station(s) operations,
- Maintenance expectations,
- And much more!

The reason for the training is to provide new and returning volunteers a basic building block of South Florida Operations expectations so they can successfully contribute to USACE's overall mission.













FY 24 National Partnership Program Summary Contined

A total of 295 USACE projects partnered with 56 organizations that have a national MOU in place, providing educational programs, health and safety, environmental and recreation improvements.

56 USACE projects benefited from the assistance of 67 nonprofit cooperating associations which supported special events, interpretive activities, exhibits and programs, operated bookstores, and bolstered volunteer programs.
