WRDA 2022, Sec 8124: Reserve Component Training



Benefits of Military Troop Support at Civil Works Projects:

- Provides invaluable and necessary training for military units to build readiness and gain construction/project management skills on projects that cannot be replicated elsewhere
- Interaction between uniformed service members with civilian technical experts in USACE provides well-rounded engineer forces that are better trained and equipped with the skills necessary to accomplish mission-essential tasks.
- Accomplishes goals of NRM program and completes projects that are unfunded and/or backlog maintenance items
- Gains efficiency for projects' strained maintenance funding



Troop Training Exercise Examples



- Heavy equipment training for road resurfacing
- Design, construction and/or repair of trails, gatehouses, campsites, fish habitat, ADA fishing docks, radio towers, bridges, drainage ditches, splash pads, playgrounds, sewer systems, pole barns, roads, parking lots, pipes, picnic shelters, stairs, sun shelters
- Disaster response
- Search and rescue training
- Boundary and monument surveys
- Aerial inspections
- Dive team underwater inspections, video, photography, assessments
- Demolition of radio tower, buildings, rocks in quarry
- Flood debris removal

Active Duty vs. Reserve vs. National Guard




- Active duty: Member serves in the military full time, may live on a military base, and can be deployed at any time.
- Reserve or National Guard: Members are not full-time active-duty military personnel, although they can be deployed at any time should the need arise.
 - Reserve: Each branch of the military has a Reserve component. The purpose of the Reserve is to provide and maintain trained units and qualified persons to be available for active duty in the armed forces when needed. The primary job of the Reserve is to fill the gaps in stateside service positions when the active-duty forces ship overseas.
 - Army or Air National Guard: While federally funded, the National Guard is organized and controlled by state, operating in a non-Federal Title 32 status. However, in times of war, the National Guard can become federalized and deployed in a Title 10 status.

Section 8124 of WRDA 2022 Authority



- Permits <u>reserve components</u> of the Armed Forces, in carrying out military training activities or otherwise fulfilling military training requirements, to perform services and furnish supplies in support of a USACE water resources development project or program without reimbursement.
- Reserve components of the Armed Forces include:
 - Army National Guard when federally activated in Title 10 status
 - Army Reserve
 - Navy Reserve
 - Marine Corps Reserve
 - Air National Guard when federally activated in Title 10 status
 - Air Force Reserve
 - Coast Guard Reserve

Key Provisions



- Services cannot be accepted from any reserve component member employed by USACE
- Soldiers performing services under this authority on USACE projects are considered employees/members of the reserve component to which they are assigned, and the soldiers will remain under the command and control of their applicable units.
- All pay, allowances, and benefits, to include any liability protection of reserve component members are 100% the responsibility of the reserve component.
 - Exception: Travel expenses of reserve component members may be funded by USACE through an Economy Act order as necessary.
- USACE may provide supervision and materials to execute a project.
- Soldiers may operate USACE vehicles, machinery, or other equipment if they have proper training, licenses, or experience in accordance with USACE policies.



Armed Forces Reserve Component Training Agreement (AFRCTA)



- All support provided by reserve components under this authority will be agreed upon/defined in an Armed Forces Reserve Component Training Agreement (AFRCTA) signed by reserve unit and USACE leadership.
- Approval levels for AFRCTA:
 - MSC Commanders for any agreement exceeding a total value of \$1,000,000 for any of their districts.
 - District Commanders for agreements with a total value greater than \$500,000, but equal to or less than \$1,000,000.
 - District Chiefs of Operations for agreements with a total value greater than \$100,000, but equal to or less than \$500,000.
 - OPMs/Park Managers for agreements with a total value equal to or less than \$100,000.
- Work accomplished by reserve components shall be within current USACE authorities and contained in the annual or five-year plan in the approved Operations Management Plan (OMP) or Master Plan.



Armed Forces Reserve Component Training Agreement (AFRCTA)



- Purpose and goal of the training exercise
- Work to be accomplished, to include a project schedule and detailed scope of work description;
- Detailed description of the project site
- Equipment, materials, personnel provided by the reserve component and by the USACE
- Responsibility for lodging and meal accommodation costs for projects not in the immediate vicinity of the reserve component location
- Safety requirements
- Security and access requirements for the project site
- Requirement that USACE review all design plans
- Responsibility for damage to USACE property
- Points of contact for each organization





Military: Operation Warfighter/Wounded Warrior







- Many agencies have hired wounded warriors into permanent positions as they "graduate" from OWF and transition out of the military.
- Many participants have indicated that OWF, as a wellness activity, restored a sense of normalcy and eased the transition back to work.
- Not just about employment Placing wounded, ill and injured Service members in supportive work settings outside of the hospital environment positively impacts the recuperation process.

- Allows Service members to gain valuable civilian work experience through specific industry training, apprenticeships, or internships during the last 180 days of service.
- For Service members: provides chance to work and learn in civilian career areas
- For USACE: access and leverage the world's most highly trained and motivated workforce

at no cost. DOD pays for all salary and benefits

- Service members participating in SkillBridge receive their military compensation and benefits, and industry partners provide the training and work experience.





Case Study: W. Kerr Scott Lake & ASU





- Make initial school commitment easy, i.e. "Could we have 10 minutes of your time to take a picture of the mascot in a life jacket? Anytime would work for us."
- At W. Kerr Scott Reservoir in SAW, Appalachian State University allowed a ranger to come to a practice to get photos and video of players, coach and mascot wearing life jackets and promoting water safety.
- Note: Always take photos of the mascot and coach separately in addition to together in case of coaching staff changes.

Origin- Ranger Eller got the idea to work with ASU after the football team made headlines for defeating Michigan, reached out to Rec and Athletic Departments to find opportunities to work together, partnership snowballed from there.


Senior Design Classes: National Innovations Team and University of Texas Arlington




- Established MOU in 2022
- Senior Design Classes are (2) Semester program: 1st Semester is planning, design, resourcing. 2nd Semester is building out the Innovation into a physical prototype/product.
- Small teams of Senior Design IT Students pair up with Innovations Sub teams and work together on challenging Innovations Prototypes and Products.
- Each group works together for an entire year. University funds first \$800 of R&D for the students.






Preliminary UTA Designs for AR Floor Projections and Park Ranger Holograms.







Southern Illinois University at Lake Shelbyville- MVS



Study aimed at determining the effects of coyotes and bobcats on survival and behavior of white-tailed deer and determine how it varies between contiguous and fragmented landscapes.

- Young female bobcat GPS collared. Travelled approx. 65 miles from site of capture within first month.
- Buck tagged at 2.5 years old. Summered on east side of the lake and crossed the lake.
- Coyote shown to have a home range of approx. 20% of Lake Shelbyville.










Boise State Kestrel Box Program







Lucky Peak Lake- NWK-Idaho

Origin: Project wanted to expand the ENS program, connected with experts at the World Center for Birds of Prey who advised that Lucky Peak would be great Kestrel habitat except there aren't any trees for cavity nesting birds. Connected with BSU who already had a Kestrel nest box program, and the partnership grew from there, including a partnership with New Roots organization that connects refugee and immigrant children to their new natural environment.




Franklin Pierce Bat Studies at Edward MacDowell



- Students conduct studies to determine bat species presence to establish a baseline data set
- Mist netting surveys in 2019
- Acoustic surveys in 2020-2021
- Seven of eight known bat species in NH documented
- Three of four state endangered bat species present
- Future studies hope to incorporate telemetry to document forest-ed areas used as roosting habitat by target species such as the northern long-eared bat.

Edward MacDowell Reservoir- NAE- New Hampshire Origin: Univ. biologist approached USACE to form partnership because this project had the most diversity of bat species in NH.






