Train to Tram Project

- City of The Dalles
 - ► MOU signed 2012
 - \$400K grant from Federal Transportation Administration to complete trail grading, trail pavement, bridge improvements, and barrier placement.
 - City received additional grants to purchase electric shuttles to replace the tour train and promote tourism.
 - City owns and operates shuttles. The Dalles Chamber of Commerce helps to promote tourism in the local media, and USACE provides ranger led tours of the dam.



Confluence Project

- Confluence Project
 - ► Work in progress <u>www.confluenceproject.org</u>
 - Federal Transportation Administration grant of \$3.5 million for parking lot redesign and an additional \$800K to fix safety concerns near entrance over the railroad tracks.

Discover Your Northwest

- Cooperative Agreement signed 2011
 - DYNW provided start-up costs for material and equipment. (Shelving, cabinets, etc.)
 - DYNW oversees major operations such as: ordering merchandise, banking, etc.
 - Our visitor center is open 5 months out
 of the year. To date, we have had over \$18K
 in sales and donations. A percentage
 of which gets donated back to the visitor center
 for <u>in-house</u> educational purposes.







Northwest Youth Corps

- ► Cooperative Agreement signed 2009
 - They provide labor in exchange for 7k/week for overhead cost. There is an
 educational component, hands-on learning of job skills, and resume building
 involved as well.
 - 2011 work at Celilo Park and The Dalles Lock and Dam; 60 youth put in 2,400 hours of service providing a value of service at over \$51K.
 - 2013 work at Avery Park and on project; 36 youth worked 1,296 hours for a value of service over \$28K.









- Youth Transition Program
 - ► Contributions, 2014
 - Local high school students needing volunteer hours to graduate and on-thejob skills, provide labor in exchange for hands-on learning, resume building and job shadowing experience.

 This year, seven students earned an accumulated total of 187 hours of service toward their needed graduation requirements for a cost savings

value of over \$4K.

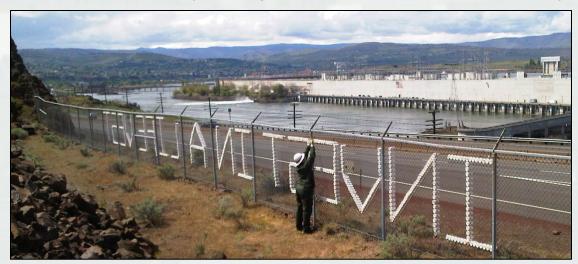








- Student Conservation Association

 - 480 hours of service completed for a value of service over \$10K.
 - Promoted water safety through interpretive outreach and projects.







Life Jacket Loaner Kiosk's in the Columbia River Gorge

- Safe Kids Columbia Gorge
 - ► MOU signed 2009
 - 2012 Safe Kids purchased/installed eight new loaner kiosks at local parks, marinas, and swim beaches in the CRG area.
 - Grand total investment of over \$10K including PFD's for each.
 - Oregon Department of Transportation helped install the kiosks via the use of their auger truck.









Safe Kids Columbia Gorge

- USACE and Safe Kids partners together to staff educational booths at local events and water safety outreach in local schools.
 - ► Cherry Fest, Children's Safety Fair, 2nd Grade Safari
 - ► 6th Grade Water Safety Poster Contest
 - Past 4 years 654 poster entries
 - Safe Kids purchases the bags and prizes for a \$160.00 investment/year.









Water Safety ~ Highway Billboard

- Meadow Outdoor Billboard Company
 - ► Contributions, 2014
 - Safe Kids CRG donation letter request.
 - Resulted in the donation of billboard space along Hwy 30 for the second place winner of this year's water safety poster contest. Advertisement will be displayed for 3 months at a donation value of \$1,625.00. It's estimated that approximately 7,000 vehicles pass by the billboard daily.

Did you know that drowning is one of the leading causes of accidental death and 9 out of 10 people who drown were not wearing a life jacket?

Which is why, in order to promote safe practices around water, The Columbia Gorge Safe Kids Coalition in partnership with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers holds a <u>water safety poster contest</u> annually at The Dalles Middle School. For the first time ever, the entire middle school's health classes are participating. This includes all 6th, 7th and 8th grade health students. The students make their poster on brown grocery bags. After the winners are announced, the finished posters are donated to the local area farmer's market and food bank. The idea is to spread the water safety message to the public at large. This way, not only do we get the kids involved, but we can engage the community as well!

In May, the top three best posters will be chosen based on creativity, originality, quality of artwork, and how well their poster relates to the theme of water safety. The prizes for the top three candidates are gift certificates to purchase a life jacket. In addition, grab bags will be given away to all top 10 nominees. The gifts bags will have whistles, activity books, carabineers, temporary tattoos, frisbees, rulers, pencils, DVD's and more; all bearing a water safety message. To spread the water safety message to a larger audience, we would love to offer a grand prize this year to the best poster in contest, of having the poster created into a billboard to be displayed in town somewhere.

Life Jacket Donations

- International Order of the Blue Gavel
 - ► Contributions 2013, possible MOU
 - Worldwide yachting club interesting in supporting water safety efforts with USACE.
 - Local chapter donated 200 life jackets to supply the Columbia River Gorge, Willamette Valley and Rouge River's life jacket loaner board program.







Vessel Safety Check's



- U.S. Coast Guard
 - ► MOU signed 2005
 - Other partners: state, county, and local police as well as state parks, fish and wildlife, state marine boards, and intertribal agencies.
 - Since we began in 2010, over 90 boats have received an approved vessel safety inspection sticker and one boat that was infested with New Zealand Mud Snails was prevented from entering the John Day River.







Spearfish Family Fishing Clinic's

- U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service
 - ► MOU signed 2008
 - Other Partners: Trout Unlimited and National Get Outdoors Foundation
 - Held in conjunction with the state of Washington's free fishing weekend.
 (no fees or fishing license required)
 - WA Department of Fish and Wildlife stocks the lake with rainbow trout and provides fishing poles and tackle.
 - Other sponsors: Biomark, local stores, bait shops and restaurants.
 - Over 225 participants in the past two years.







Take A Warrior Fishing Events

- Catch A Special Thrill CAST
 - ► MOU signed 2012
 - First event of its' kind held on the Columbia River.
 - CAST provided a broad network of contacts, monetary support, t-shirts, hats, and staff support.
 - Other Sponsors were: All State and Northwest Industrial Supply (provided a BBQ lunch) and Grinder's coffee (free coffee coupons).
 - Six Veterans and their families, plus seven volunteer boat captains from all over the state participated.







The Dalles Dam Eagle Watch

- U.S. Forest Service
 - ► MOU signed 2008
 - Forest Service and Rowena Wildlife Clinic provide live raptor education and volunteers.
 - This event has been held annually for the past four years and has drawn over 1,130 visitors.







Spearfish Park – Road Improvements

Port of Klickitat

- ► MOU signed 2009
 - Applied for Federal Transportation Administration grant to pave Port of Klickitat owned road leading into Spearfish Park.
 - Grant submittal \$188k Port matches 13.5%
 - Goal was to pave over the current gravel entry way; approximately 1 mile, into Spearfish. Did not receive the grant. However, we were successful in the installation of a vehicle gate on Port of Klickitat property.
 - Other Partners: Bonneville Power Administration due to a power line easement.





Outdoor Reader Board Messaging

- Griffith Toyota and The Dalles Whatonka High School
 - ► Contribution, 2013 present
 - Promotes water safety through the use of outdoor reader boards.
 - USACE provides colorful graphics, posters, and water safety messages.

Google Volunteer Service Day

 - 42 Google employees provided a combined 129 hours of service for a cost saving of over \$3k in 2013. Gorge Safe Kids offers life jackets at loaner boards

It's now free to keep kids safe on the water with a life jacket from one of 20 life jacket loaner boards along the Columbia, Willamette and Rogue Rivers.

The local life jacket stations were established through a partnership of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Columbia Gorge Safe Kids Coalition, as well as other cooperating organizations

"We installed nine this summer," said Amber Tilton of the Corps, including one at The Dalles Riverfront Park.

Safe Kids had the kiosks made over the winter and they were installed this spring and summer.

"It was a collaborative effort," Tilton said. "We had to get permission from all the managing agencies (Port of Hood River, Port of The Dalles, and Washington State Parks)."

The stations include a variety of jacket sizes and instructions to fit a jacket properly. Borrowers are asked to return the jackets when they have finished recreating.

Nearby locations where life jackets can be borrowed include The Dalles Marina, The Dalles Riverfront Park, Celilo Park, Mayer State Park, Heritage

Landing at the mouth of the Deschutes River and LePage Park on the Oregon shore in Wasco and Sherman counties, and Columbia Hills State Park and Maryhill State Park on the Washington shore in Klickitat County.

Other sites in the Columbia Gorge include Hood River Waterfront Park and Hamilton Island Boat Ramp at Bonneville Lock and Dam. Plymouth Park near Hermiston also have one of the stations.

Drowning is preventable so please recreate safely by following these helpful tips: always wear a life jacket, learn to swim well, always swim with a buddy, learn "Reach-Throw-Row-don't Go" rescue techniques, take a safe boating class, and never drink and boat.

"Don't think that drowning only happens to other people or other people is children," says Melissa Rinehart, Portland District's water safety coordinator. "Remember that children are happiest when they are safe. If you love them, put them in a life jacket; because they love you, wear yours."
